Impact

1. As a result of COVID- 19, there is no attainment data for end of key stage expectations. *This will be closely monitored through internal tracking throughout 2020/21.*
2. As a result of COVID-19, there is no data for progress measure made by KS2 pupils. *This will be closely monitored through internal tracking throughout 2020/21.*
3. STEM week was an expansion on our usual Maths week and received positive feedback from pupils. This was a great opportunity to give pupils a focus point to engage with the curriculum, as well as expanding their awareness of other opportunities. The week included trips to Leyland Trucks and BNFL, visits from engineers, scientists and lots more.

Altru theatre visited school before Christmas to perform for the whole school. Ideally, we would love to take all pupils to the theatre but the costs are too much, however having a travelling drama group perform engages pupils in 'live' storytelling, supporting English development and providing an opportunity some pupils may never get.

4. Our family support worker has interactions with a large number of pupils and their families. Whilst not exclusively PP children, a large amount of PP children are supported through her work. There were significant home challenges for several PP families in the last eighteen months and our family support worker was able to support them through this. This year, of all years, that work was unquantifiable in many ways but the consistent communication/ visits to families in lockdown allowed school to maintain strong links to ensure safeguarding needs were met, families supported financially and through food banks, guided towards family support for mental health and wellbeing. All pupils returned following lockdown, with the work of the FSW in maintaining this support throughout the forced closure key to doing so.

Prior to lockdown (March 2020), 7 pupils (4 PP) took part in LEGO therapy with all showing improvement in concentration and listening skills (but with no finalised exit data due to closure). 20 pupils (5 PP) took part in Chattering Chimps to develop speaking and listening skills for EYFS/Year1. Again, there were positive signs but no full exit data due to closure.

5. Brass Tuition has again given children who would not otherwise have had the chance, a (shortened) year of excellent music tuition, both in singing and learning to play a brass instrument. 3 pupils with PP have benefitted from this in Y5 and Y6 as they have chosen to carry on their tuition.
6. Attendance figures better than the previous national for absence and persistent absence when comparing overall to overall nationally and ever 6 FSM to same group nationally (no official data released for 2019/20 due to COVID-19 pandemic). These are a slight decrease on last year although are not comparing a like-for-like period (attendance usually better once winter months are over).

7. Homework club

- Attended on a regular basis by 6 x Year 5 Pupil Premium pupils and 8 x Year 6 Pupil Premium (until lockdown March 2020). *Similar to last year.*
- Allowed those pupils to revise core maths skills eg. number bonds.
- Submit homework on time – raising academic achievement and preparation for transition to secondary school.

8. The Science Room club was used by a wide range of pupils, including pupil premium children. There was a reduction in poor playtime behaviour and less disruption to the start of lessons, aiding pupil premium children to come into class and focus.

9. Pupil made progress with TLP, although this is ongoing following lockdown.

10. Reading Plus saw a huge impact on the Year 6 cohort as a whole, improving the rate at which pupils were able to read and comprehend. This was continued during lockdown and some pupil premium users continued to access this through until the summer (extended from the original deadline) to support their preparations for high school.
