wooden toys	objects made from wood such as boats, cup and ball
metal toys	objects made from metal such as spinning tops and cars
plastic toys	objects made from plastic (often modern toys)
new	objects from the present
old	objects from the past
same	something that is similar/matching to something else
different	something that is not similar/matching to something else

Prior learning

In EYFS, pupils have considered pass age of time through the 'story of me and my family'. They have developed an awareness of the concept of sorting common materials to group objects.



Key Questions

- What toys do we play with now?
- What toys did we play with as a baby/toddler?
- What toys did our parents/grandparents play with?
- What did children in the Victorian age play with ? (What did rich / poorer children play with?)
- How are toys from the past/present same/different?
- How can these toys be sorted/ordered?

Key Knowledge

- Toys have existed for thousands of years. They were made from the material available at the time.
- Toys have changed over time.
- Toys are made of different materials including wood, metal and plastic.
- Toys can be sorted into different types to work out how old they are.
- Toys can be ordered using 'old', 'new', 'before', 'after'
- Victorian children played with toys made from wood, paper and metal. Poorer children played mostly with homemade toys.
